"Indo-Pacific is Our Priority" says U.S. Defense Chief

The U. S. Secretary of Defense, Lloyd J. Austin III Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III wrapped up his 12th visit to the Indo-Pacific in Fiji. Before Fiji, he visited Australia, the Philippines, and Laos. This tour included important engagements in Australia, the Philippines, and Laos, where Secretary Austin emphasized the United States' commitment to strengthening alliances and enhancing regional security.

In Fiji, he signed the Acquisition and Cross Servicing Agreement (ACSA) with his Fijian counterpart to enhance logistics cooperation between the two countries. He said, "This agreement will mean closer ties and closer logistics cooperation between our forces, including humanitarian assistance and disaster relief." In addition, he announced the Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA), empowering both countries to work closely in the region and with the Pacific Islands countries. He also met with Pacific Islands Forum Secretary General Baron Waqa. Besides, he committed to U.S. support for Fiji's military modernization through enhanced Foreign Military Financing of \$4.9 million in new U.S. security pending congressional approval. He emphasized shared values and shared vision of free and open Indo-Pacific and said, "The Indo-Pacific is our priority theater and our partnership with Fiji and other Pacific Island Countries is vital to a free and open Indo-Pacific."

In Australia, he announced the initiative to integrate Japan into the U.S. force posture with the trilateral and multilateral military exercises and by advancing trilateral cooperation on Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD). Following his visit to Australia, he met his counterpart in the Philippines and signed the General Security of Military Information Agreement (GSOMIA), which provides a legal framework enabling the United States and the Philippines to share, handle, and protect each other's classified military information.

Austin attended the Association of Southeast Asian Nations Defense Ministers' Meeting-Plus (ADMM-Plus) in Laos. He released the first-ever "U.S. Department of Defense Vision Statement for a Prosperous and Secure Southeast Asia." The statement promotes practical cooperation with the ASEAN countries and includes activities to improve air, cyber, and maritime domain awareness, establish emerging leader's exchanges, and increase training and exercises. He also announced the second edition of the ASEAN-United States Maritime Exercise in 2025 to advance maritime security in the region. Concluding his recent trip and reflecting on the progress made over the past four years, Secretary Austin stated, "We have accomplished a lot" by collaborating with likeminded countries to promote an open and secure Indo-Pacific region.

G-20 Summit Concluded in Brazil

Leaders of twenty major economies met in Rio di Janeiro in Brazil on No.18-19. The leaders released the joint declaration addressing the topics of Brazilian Presidency focused on -major conflicts; social inclusion and the fight against hunger and poverty; sustainable development, energy transitions and climate action; and the reform of global governance institutions. Leaders emphasize the importance of coordinated actions to combat climate change, promote just energy transitions, and preserve the environment. They also stress the need for comprehensive reform in global governance, including strengthening the United Nations, modernizing the international financial system, fostering an inclusive multilateral trading system, and promoting the ethical development of artificial intelligence. Despite the joint declaration, differences between the group members continues on war in Ukraine and the Middle-East conflict. Read More

Indonesian President Prabowo has arrived in Abu Dhabi for a state visit.

During his visit, he met with United Arab Emirates (UAE) President

Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan (MBZ), highlighting the significance of strengthening bilateral relations. The two leaders signed several Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) in various fields, including technology, infrastructure, tourism, and mining.
